

Registration Form: Registration will only be available online at <u>www.sfrtarea3.org</u>. You may enter a 1st and 2nd choice in each session you plan on attending to ensure we place you in a class of your choosing. Again, you must register online at <u>www.sfrtarea3.org</u>.

Choice of Classes: Most classes fill up quickly so make sure you get your registration and payment in as soon as possible to ensure your seat in the class of your choice. Classes with low enrollment will be cancelled 2 weeks prior to school, so if you need a specific class, get your registration and payment in as soon as possible to ensure your class makes it!

Payment of Class Fees and Confirmation: Registration fees must be submitted promptly upon application. Purchase orders from municipalities will be accepted with payment to follow immediately. Confirmation for classes will only be sent to a valid email address upon receipt of payment!

Deadlines and Refunds: Registration fee for a single session or the entire weekend is \$75 per student for payments received prior to close of business on February 14, 2026. Registration fee will be \$85 per student after February 14 and for any on-site registrations. Refunds must be requested by email prior to February 14, 2026 to pat.thompson@kctcs.edu listing the students name, method of payment to GRFA (check or credit card), and to whom to make the refund (check to submitting party on original payment).

Junior Firefighters/Explorers: With this conference being a lecture setting, Junior Firefighters/Explorers are welcome at the Officers School; however, you must submit a letter from the Chief of the sponsoring agency stating they are aware that the Junior/Explorer is attending and the contact information with name and phone number of the on-site supervisor of the attending Junior/Explorer.





Thursday Class- All Day

1. Fire Suppression Systems for Sprinkler Inspectors.

Instructor: Richard Peddicord

This class will satisfy the requirements for the six (6) hours continuing education for fire suppression system sprinkler inspectors licensed by the Kentucky Department of Housing, Building, and Construction. This will cover the code requirements, key definitions, the allowable types of fire sprinkler systems, system components, specific tests, inspections and maintenance activities, and required test duration for valves, sprinklers, gauges, alarm devices, fire department connections and fire pumps. This program includes examples and interactive discussion on how the requirements of NFPA 25 are applied.

About the Instructor:

Richard Peddicord began his firefighting experience at the age of 14 years old by attending the KY State Fire School in Lexington. After graduating high school, he volunteered with Fayette County FD. He went on to work for the Kentucky State Police. He spent more than a decade designing, installing and inspecting fire protection systems in Kentucky. Richard has dedicated his professional career to learning and sharing his knowledge of the preservation of life and property in all fire and safety-related areas. Richard surpassed his childhood dream by becoming the Assistant Director for the Kentucky State Fire Marshal's Office. During his tenure with the Division of Fire Prevention, he had many accomplishments, including overseeing the initial operations of the Kentucky Safe Cigarette Program and the states sprinkler inspection program. Richard retired from the Kentucky Fire Marshal's office in 2020. Today, he serves as the Assistant Chief of the Stamping Ground Fire Department.

2. Emergency Incident Survivability Profile-Rescue or Recovery

Instructor: Kenn Fontenot

Rescue or Recovery? Tips for determining the Survivability Profile of victims at emergencies. Survivability potential of victims are clues learned during initial size up including fire and smoke conditions, building construction, fire department training/equipment, and available resources. These tips can be applied to any emergency.

About the instructor:

Kenn Fontenot is a charter member and the first Fire Chief of the LeBlanc Volunteer Fire Department. Fontenot is a former principal member of the NFPA 1010 committee, NFPA 1700, and a former alternate member on the NFPA 1021 committee. He served for 12 years as the Regional Fire Training Coordinator at the Louisiana State University Fire and Emergency Training Institute and is currently instructing for the Louisiana Fire and Emergency Training Academy which is the state fire training agency. He is a past-President and life member of the Louisiana Fireman's Association. He also holds an Associate's Degree in Fire Science.

3. Roadmap to Success

Instructor: Joshua Dixon

NEW for 2026

The "Roadmap to Success" class offers and in-depth exploration of the success framework utilized by the Henderson Fire Department. Participants will engage in discussions centered on the strategies for becoming a firefighting preparation first department. Key topics will include:

- Mission: Understanding the department's commitment to serving he community effectively.
- Vision for the Future: Outlining the long-term goals of what the organization wants to achieve.
- Core Values: Examining the Foundational principles the guide actions and decisionmaking within the department.
- Defining Success: Identifying and analyzing the metrics and milestones that characterize success within the organization.
- Training Program: An in-depth look at the organization year-round training schedule.
- Succession Planning: Identifying and developing personnel to ensure seamless transition and operational continuity.

This course aims to equip participants with the knowledge to contribute to their organization and enhance their own professional development.

About the instructor:

Fire Chief Josh Dixon has dedicated 18 years to the Henderson Fire Department, advancing through multiple roles including Firefighter, Engineer, Captain, and Division Chief, before becoming Fire Chief. His extensive experience covers multiple aspects of firefighting and leadership within the department. Recently, he was honored as the 2025 Career Kentucky Fire Chief of the Year by the Kentucky Association of Fire Chiefs.

4. Buildings on Fire: Tactical Risks for the First-Due Company and Commander

Instructor: Christopher Naum

New for 2026.

Arriving companies and personnel at today's structure fires must be able to rapidly and accurately identify key elements of a building, process that data based upon a widening field of variables present on today's evolving fireground and implement timely actions that address prioritized actions requiring intervention. This program will present tactical risks and key considerations for the First-Due Company, Company Officer and Commander affecting and influencing operational risk management, command and tactical safety and tactical protocols based upon occupancy risks, reading the building and adaptive management principles that incorporate the Building FACTS model and risks. This program presents insights from a wide variety of building types, eras and vintage and applies insights for Modern Methods of Construction, Tactical Fire Dynamic Challenges and Tactical and Command and Control Considerations. This class is geared towards Company and Command Officers; however, all ranks and experience levels will benefit from this informative and highly engaging program.

About the instructor:

A 50-year fire service veteran and a highly regarded national and international instructor, author, lecturer and fire officer, a distinguished authority on building construction sciences affecting fireground operations, command and tactics, he has traveled extensively throughout the USA and globally delivering training programs on building construction & architecture sciences and firefighting, fireground leadership, command management and operational safety for over thirty-seven years. He is a sought-after national keynote speaker, instructor and presenter and has served as an FDIC General Session Keynote speaker and National Fire Academy Adjunct Instructor.

5. The 25th Hour: Priority Management, Not Time Management

Instructor: Zach Mathews

This class has been part of my leadership series for four years. Using my experience as an executive coach for fire chiefs, I share real stories about the effectiveness of the content. The focus is on setting priorities, establishing balance in life, and delegating tasks to direct reports.

About the Instructor:

Zach Mathews is an experienced speaker, international trainer and executive coach who inspires audiences with his fast paced and entertaining programs focused on leadership, communication, and personal growth. With over twenty-eight years in public safety, Zach brings a wealth of experience to the table. His journey has taken him from conservation officer and wildland firefighter to leadership roles such as Investigation Section commander, Training Section commander, Logistics Manager, and Office of Professional Standards commander. In 2019, the Indiana Department Homeland Security recognized Zach's leadership abilities, tapping him to teach essential skills like body language and executive leadership courses across the state. Zach now serves as the Planning Section Chief for the Indiana Fire & Public Safety Academy where he and his staff are responsible for firefighter certifications and instructor standards. Zach also coordinates statewide executive leadership training programs to include the biannual Indiana Fire Chief's Academy, and a company officer executive leadership course taught throughout the state. Zach is a John Maxwell certified executive coach and DISC behavioral analysist who works one-onone with fire chiefs to achieve both professional and personal goals. Zach has trained thousands throughout his career and is motivated to provide training that will positively impact the fire service. But what truly sets Zach apart is his passion for effective communication.

6. Responding to Civil Unrest and Mass Violence

Instructor: Frank Montes De Oca

Groups are frustrated and angry. When emotions boil over, civil unrest occurs. Sadly, fire and emergency services seldom prepare for spontaneous communitywide violence. Recently, focus has been on preparing for the active shooter, which is just one aspect of the challenges first responders will face. In the near future communities will face challenging hot-button issues related to politics, ideology and religion. This **4-hour presentation** is targeted to all ranks and disciplines focusing on knowing the players, intel gathering and sharing, partner communications, avoiding and surviving ambushes and managing mass casualties under duress.

About the Instructor:

Frank Montes de Oca is a thirty-eight-year veteran of the fire and emergency services. Beginning as firefighter medic working through the ranks appointed to positions including Chief of EMS, Training Bureau Commander and senior operations officer for the Orange County (FL) Fire and Rescue Department. Later he was appointed as the Fire Chief and Emergency Services Director of a large combination department in the Orlando metro area. Now residing in North Carolina, Chief Montes de Oca remains active as a contributing editor for *The Pennsylvania Fireman* magazine serving first responders throughout Pennsylvania, Virginia and the southeast. He is an adjunct instructor for the National Fire Academy and is qualified to present programs for OSHA and EPA.

7. Firefighter Cancer Support Network: You Fight Fire, We Fight Cancer

Instructor: Marc Henderson

NEW for 2026

The harsh reality is that almost two-thirds of the firefighters battling fires today will be battling cancer tomorrow. Cancer remains the leading cause of line-of-duty deaths among firefighters. By making a meaningful contribution to our mission, to assist firefighters and EMS providers and their immediate families diagnosed with cancer through our unique support services, we can make a greater impact on our nation's heroes battling cancer. The goals of this class will be to educate firefighters and EMS Personnel about their increased risk of developing cancer; encourage actions and behaviors to reduce or prevent exposure to occupational cancer hazards; encourage healthy lifestyle choices to further reduce cancer risk; and provide information about screenings and early detection, have conversations about culture change, and share resources available to firefighters, EMS personnel, and their families following a cancer diagnosis.

About the Instructor:

Marc Henderson is the Kentucky State Director for the Firefighter Cancer Support Network and is a cancer survivor. He was diagnosed with Prostate Cancer in 2021. He has 37 years' experience as a volunteer firefighter/EMT in Daviess County Kentucky and has worked for the Kentucky Fire Commission for 16 years, currently serving as the Region 1 Coordinator Marc served as the Green River Firefighters Association Secretary since 2006, and was the KY Firefighters Association President in 2024. He serves on the Bryant Stiles Officers School Board and is the Vendor Coordinator for the school. He also is the School Coordinator for Kentucky State Fire School held every June in Lexington.

8. Fire Officer – Leading Volunteer Firefighters

Instructors: John Buckman and Tim Holman

NEW for 2026

This course is specifically aimed at officers who lead volunteer firefighters. We will examine the skills necessary to be effective at motivating volunteers to do their job and be there when the call comes in. Leading is difficult especially when you are trying to motivate people who are not being compensated. Topics to be discussed: Accountability - Leaning Forward - Respect for yourself and others - humility - delegation - integrity and values.

About the Instructors:

20. It Happened to Us, the Anatomy of a Near Miss

Firefighters are often reluctant to share events that went wrong or had a negative outcome for fear of being viewed by their peers or stakeholders as unprepared or poor performers. These incidents are often hidden in the corners of fire station or swept under the rug. They are even treated as personal failures of leadership, but rarely are they treated as a learning opportunity. One such event left our department asking questions and examining how we as an organization handle near misses and what we can do to improve performance and procedures. While we had two firefighters bail out of a window due to a sudden and drastic change in interior conditions, the journey our department took to learn from situations like this many and others in order to make cultural changes was profound. This fire, which appeared to be out by all indications of visual and thermal imaging changed in a matter of seconds with temperatures rapidly increasing forced firefighters to choose between ignoring their department MAYDAY policy and immediately bailing out of a window. This class examines how we view, plan for, and experience near misses as well as what you and your agency can do to create a culture of progress.

- Where required, ensure emergency fire evacuation drills are held.
- Advise property owners of the inspector's findings.

This class will explore case studies of past catastrophic events and share the presenter's firsthand experiences preparing responders to undertake operational plans and tactical actions to minimize tragedy.

About the instructor:

Frank Montes de Oca is a thirty-eight-year veteran of the fire and emergency services. Beginning as firefighter medic working through the ranks appointed to positions including Chief of EMS, Training Bureau Commander and senior operations officer for the Orange County (FL) Fire and Rescue Department. - Multiple Alarm Large Warehouse Fire involving Multiple Agencies, after a night of several Water Rescues response during Torrential Rain.

First Arriving Engine Company: This program will help the student understand the role of the engine company on the fireground. This program will help develop strategies for risk assessment and develop tools to manage risk in all aspects of the fire service.

Mike Prete retired after 37 years of active service as an Assistant Fire Chief at Montgomery County (MD) Fire and Rescue Services, a large combination department near our nation's capital. Eastern Kentucky Flooding-2025: On Friday February 14, 2025, approximately nine inches of rain fell in Kentucky resulting in twenty-two deaths. **Doug Hargreaves** will present on the response to massive devastation that occurred from flooding that went through the Eastern portion of Kentucky. Items covered will be the Command/Coordination and response activities that were implemented to save lives.

London Tornado: Chantz McPeek was one of the first responders that arrived on the scene following the devastating tornado that traversed Southeastern Kentucky on May 16, 2025. The tornado was on the ground for almost one hour and thirty minutes and resulted in twenty deaths and 108 injuries including one Line of Duty Death of a local firefighter along the 60-mile path. **Chantz McPeek and Shane Lynch** will detail the response that occurred in the London area.

Bardstown Nursing Home Fire: In March 2025 at 06:38, the Bardstown Fire Department was dispatched for a fire at a nursing home facility in Bardstown. 22 residents had to be transported due to smoke inhalation. This course will talk about the challenges faced as a small full-time department. The failures of the facility that contributed to fire growth and spread and the lessons learned. **Chief Todd Spalding** will present this session.

Louisville Bridge Rescue: March 01, 2024, following an accident on the Clark Memorial Bridge in Louisville that left a female truck driver's truck dangling for nearly 40 minutes, responders will detail the rescue efforts that brought her back to safety. **Captain Michael Renn** will be presenting this session.

37. Are You Combat Ready?

Combat ready is an organizational culture that creates firefighters and EMS providers that are physically, mentally, emotionally ready, and skilled to engage any incident they are called upon to mitigate.

Conventional training occurs during drills and scheduled training. Conventional training primarily focuses on skill development. Combat Ready training zeros in on developing Muscle Memory, Critical Thinking, performing under pressure and stress. It prepares the individual to work through the emotional aspects of an incident. To shunt the stress away from the incident temporarily and encompasses the physical and emotional impact on performance.

Combat Ready training is a daily endeavor to raise the standard of performance for all individuals in the department. Once the standard is reached, the bar is raised. Continuous improvement is the goal.

Five Elements of Combat ready:

- Skill Development is exceptional
- Muscle Memory allows high performance in extreme conditions.
- Stress Shunt
- Physical Aspect
- Emotional Aspect

About the instructor:

Tim is a 49-year veteran of Fire & EMS. He currently serves as chief of the German Township Fire & EMS in West Central Ohio. He has conducted training programs on leadership, fire and EMS management and safety issues in 42 states.

Tim graduated with honors from Ottawa University in Kansas. He has an extensive background in health care management, the fire service and organizational development. He is a member of the International Association of Fire Chiefs (EMS Section And VCOS Section), the Ohio Fire Chiefs and the National Association of EMTs.
